Eight Webmasters from six different chapters attended including David. The purpose of the training session was to learn how David has set up the basic Chapter Web sites and how to make updates to the web sites for chapter activities.

The Chapter Webmasters have a range of Web skill and experience, from those who are running multiple Web sites to those who are just starting to learn. David had five PCs available for us to use and some of us brought our own laptops to make notes and updates directly to our Web sites.

AACA has a central server capability for hosting AACA websites. The Web server is then divided up and web sites are allocated to Regions and Chapters. AACA uses Joomla to manage the Web site content. Joomla is a free open source content management system for publishing content on the Web. It has configuration and

Spotlight on Dave Deyton

Dave Deyton and his brother Jack grew up in Jacksonville, NC at Camp Lejeune. Their father, John, was a physician and their mother Clara was a nurse. During the war in Vietnam, John was called to duty and was the Commanding Officer of the First Hospital Company in Vietnam. He found it to be an interesting assignment for an OB-GYN. Nonetheless, his experience was such a positive one that he elected to remain in the Navy upon completing his obligation. John was active in the Navy for approximately 30 years, largely at Camp Lejeune, before he went in to private practice.

From second grade through high school graduation, Dave lived with his family in Jacksonville. Even then, Dave loved to tinker with engines and tells the story that when he was 10 he received a set of tools and promptly took apart the lawn mower. (He did get it back together.) He later had his heart set on attending a small engine repair course but was too young to enroll. Consequently, his father enrolled in the course but Dave was the one who took it.

During the year that John spent in Vietnam, Dave and his brother moved with their mother into her parents' home in Norlina, NC. Their uncles lived not far away, and Dave enjoyed playing on their farms and tinkering. Later, he would often spend summers with his great-uncle in Ridgeway/Norlina. Of great appeal to Dave was his uncle's lathe and small forge.

Dave has fond memories of his visits to Norlina, and particularly remembers Mr. Hayes, who had some

very old automobiles, including a 1911 Metz. In addition to old vehicles, Mr. Hayes had tons of automobile parts stashed in cigar boxes. People would come from all over to search through those boxes, often finding just what they needed.

Dave's father loved old cars and had his heart set on owning a Corvette: instead, he got a Datsun 280 ZX which Dave says "has hardly been out of the garage." John still owns that car and occasionally drives it. Having grown up around military vehicles, it's no surprise that Dave has a fondness for jeeps. When the family would drive to the mountains to visit relatives, they always stopped in Winston Salem at the Jeep dealership so Dave could admire the new jeeps. Instead of a jeep, however, Dave's first old car was a 1970 Beetle. There was a hobby shop on the base where he could take the car and work on it, using their tools, for about 75 cents a day. Dave still has the Beetle, but it too needs restoration.

Following high school graduation, Dave went to Wake Tech to study computer engineering and met his future wife, Kim. They married in 1985 and moved immediately into the home they live in today, in Fuquay. A few years later, Wes was added to the family. Now at Wake Tech, Wes has often accompanied Dave to Triangle chapter activities. Kim is a medical surgical nurse at Rex Hospital, where she has been for



nearly 20 years.

New Brakes

Dave finally has his jeep – two of them, actually -- and both are works in progress. The 1964 CJ5 is a civilian jeep, which Dave bought used about 6 years ago. He is working on the body of this one. Just last year, through a friend of a friend in Petersburg, VA, Dave purchased a military jeep -- a 1955 M38 – A1. According to Dave, it is now in pretty good shape with new brakes and a rebuilt rear-end. The steering box needs to be put back together and then perhaps it can be ready for a spring meet (maybe the one in 2010). One thing very special about the military jeep is that it was built with a 24-volt ignition system so that it could be driven underwater. Just imagine what a huge draw it would be for the club to offer the Take-a-Par-T assembly and an underwater driving exhibition!

After getting his degree in computer engineering, Dave worked as an electronic engineering assistant for a number of years, but found the work to be too erratic. He returned to Wake Tech for a degree in Heavy Equipment and Transportation Technology, which resulted in a job at Gregory Poole. He left Poole and was working at a body shop when a friend told him about a part-time job with the NC Department of Agriculture. He got the job and was later hired full-time.

He is currently an agricultural commodity grader, grading soybeans and other grains, many of which are exported overseas.

Dave was introduced to Triangle at a car display down at the state Capitol building. He met Dan Fucella there and the two of them talked jeeps. Dave has been a member of Triangle Chapter for just a few years, and is already on the board of directors. When asked what about the Triangle Chapter appeals to him, Dave replied that he enjoys going to the car shows and attending the chapter meetings. He loves talking with other antique auto enthusiasts about old cars and learning from them.

In addition to the Triangle Chapter, Dave is a member of the Military Vehicle Preservation Association (MVPA) and likes going to car shows where military vehicles are present. They're also a good place to find parts for his military jeep.

Both of Dave's parents are currently living in Jacksonville, but will soon be moving to Windsor Point, not far from the Deytons. Dave looks forward to having his parents close by, and we look forward to meeting them at one of our chapter gatherings in 2010.

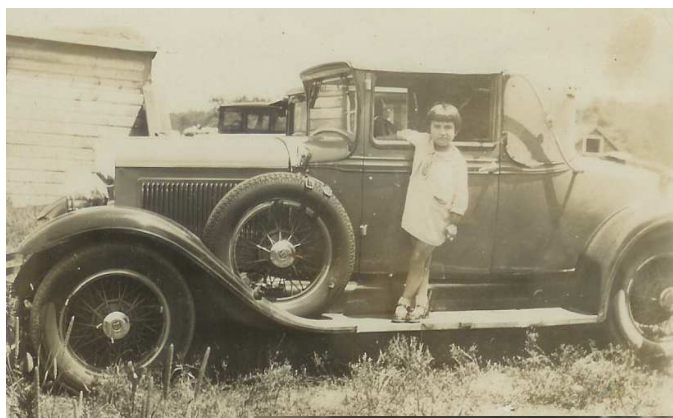
Auto Identification – December
