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### Other Costs Involved in Buying an Antique Automobile

Buying an antique car sometimes involves unexpected "other costs". There are unavoidable costs involved in bringing a restoration project home. Like everything else about antique cars, these costs add up. The best advice is, don't keep track of these costs. Here are some other costs that I have experienced. While these thoughts were meant to be humorous when I started, it is obvious, some of these are the result of my experience.

When you finally find that antique car to buy, the first challenge is how to get it home. The car is always some distance away from home. Let's face it, the next door neighbor rarely has a collector car for sale. Besides, a good rule to follow is never move a neighbor's mess into your yard.

The first "other" cost is gas money to go and look at the car. It takes a second trip to make the deal, and a third trip to determine what you will need to move it, and finally a fourth trip to go get it. The final trip usually involves more than one vehicle. It is best to take someone different with you on each trip so they don't talk you out of buying the car. Assuming the car you found is near Fuquay Varina and you live in Raleigh, the estimated gas cost per trip at \$2.52.9/gallon is \$8.09 per trip, or about \$40.64 total.

It would be good if the car you just bought was running, but the general rule is, running cars are not for sale. Therefore, you have two choices, get it started or haul it home. To get it started you will have to find a battery. Usually your extra battery is completely dead. A cheap new battery costs \$35.00 at Walmart. If you forget an old battery for core charge add \$7.00.

You will need a five gallon gas can, full. The lawn mower gas can will work, but it is always empty. Add \$12.50 for gas. Add \$3.39 for starter fluid too.

Two of four tires are always flat on any antique car that does not start. One tire can usually be inflated and will hold air for two days, but the other will have to be replaced. The cost of a used tire and wheel will be \$10 if you think ahead and/or \$25 if you need to buy one.

If something is missing under the hood such as a carburetor, belt, battery cable, hose, or generator, don't count on getting the car started. You can buy these necessary items and try to fix it where you pick up the car. The cost for parts will be between \$10 and \$162. It will be cold and dark before you get the car started.

You have a better chance of getting an antique car running in your garage where you have tools and parts.

Your garage is closer to the local auto parts stores and friends who can help.

How do you get it to your garage? When you were in high school it was a matter of getting a friend with a rope or a chain and towing it home. If you recall towing a car, it usually involved damage to one of the two bumpers and a very dangerous ride close behind a tow car.

Today, you need to be more careful. Your choices are: buy a trailer \$1200-\$1800, rent a trailer \$75, hire a roll-back \$65-\$80, hire a wrecker \$60, or borrow a trailer (cost = unspecified IOUs). A trailer works best but you will need a winch or several friends to help you get the car on the trailer. The winch will cost about \$110. Buying a trailer is expensive, but if you plan to own several vintage cars the cost per car gets better.

When you finally get the car home you need to put it out of sight or someone may complain. Your choices are to put in behind the garage, in the garage, in your storage building or in someone else's storage building. You can rent space to keep the car for \$20-\$160 a month. Another choice is to build a building or an addition, but that can cost will between \$300-\$25,000 depending on whether you can build it yourself. If you plan to put the car in the driveway or park it outside you will need a cover, \$10 for plastic to \$150 for a custom fit cover

Oh yes, if you plan to put the car in the garage or driveway you should also plan on buying dinner for your wife, \$20-\$35. You may also have to buy a valentine, \$10-\$25, even in September.

You can add up the cost for your options. If you think about all of these things you may never buy another vintage car. However, with some planning and experience you can reduce these costs by volume (buy several vin-

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## Are You Positive? By Joel Hoffman

I'd like to "apply" for the "Bad Luck Trophy" from the Triangle Chapter car show May, 2. I spent Friday afternoon before the show getting my 1966 Mini Cooper ready. Saturday morning, the battery was dead because I apparently left a light switch on. It was so dead that my charger wouldn't recognize a battery was attached, and wouldn't charge it. So------

I grabbed the brand new battery from my E-Type Jaguar and installed it. As soon as I turned on the ignition switch, the wiring harness for the starting circuit and alternator burned up in a fairly spectacular way.

This car is supposed to be positive ground. All of them WERE positive ground. The owners manual, shop manual, and all the other books I have say it's POSITIVE GROUND. Apparently, a previous owner converted it to NEGATIVE GROUND, and the reversed polarity blew right through the diode in the alternator.


