# A DREAM COMES TRUE....... By Fred Harley

Editors note: On a cold afternoon in January I visited Fred Harley's garage to have look at the 1911 Buick he had just acquired. I was impressed with the amount of brass. Fred had already polished all the brass to a very fine shine. Fred gave me an tour of this impressive machine and pointed out the priority improvements he is planning.

Fred also obtained a very nice collection of Buick literature relative to the car. As a bonus Fred obtained some Model-T literature. Fred writes,

"I was born and raised in the Detroit area in the 40's and 50's on Pleasant Street in Birmingham, Michigan. Many neighbors worked for the auto com-



panies and one in particular, Bud Goodman, who worked for GM had a small garage in his back yard. remember very clearly when I was 10-12 years old sneaking into Mr. Goodman's yard to peek through a small window in his garage to see a beautiful adorned with brass headlights and trim.

I was mesmerized by that car and had always dreamed of owning a brass car like that someday.

Flash ahead to Hershey 2009. In the Chocolate Field flea market was a 1912 Buick Model 35 covered with brass and in fairly good condition. I talked to the owner on Wednesday; he started the engine and gave me some history of the car. I decided to think about the car overnight, talk to Sue that evening and return the next day. On Thursday I again had more questions for the owner and said I would return on Friday. After two sleepless nights I decided to purchase the car and returned Friday morning. At 8:30 in the morning the owner was talking to two other gentlemen while I was again looking over the car. As I approached the owner

I overheard one of the men say, "I'll buy it for \$\$". I was really bummed out and kicking myself for 3 days of procrastination. Stupid, Fred.

We arrived home from Hershey Saturday afternoon. On Sunday morning still bummed out and mad that I missed my dream of owning a brass car I decided to check out EBay, and other web sites for antique cars. On the Horseless Carriage Club of America



(HCCA) web site was an ad for a 1911 Buick Model 33 located in Statesville, NC. The car was listed by a widow whose husband passed away 5 years earlier and had been an avid collector owning 15 Buicks with the 1911 being the oldest and his favorite. She said two other gentlemen stopped by to see the car on their way to Hershey, were very interested and would send her an email after Hershey.

With my engines revved after losing the car at Hershey I was determined to check out this car ASAP. I called the owner Sunday evening asking to see the car Monday afternoon. Monday was a gray, overcast, rainy day but the 1911 Buick was a shiny brass beacon sitting in the garage. The engine fired up on magneto, the car had a relatively new Brass works radiator, and looked overall in better shape than the 1912 Buick at Hershey. I made an offer and purchased the car for a similar price of the one sold at Hershey.

The car looks like it was restored 30-40 years ago but all the brass and features are there and in good condition. There is no rust and basically it is in very good shape and drivable. The body is painted red (original was dark blue) and the wheels are cream white as the original. The brass is dull and tarnished, engine needs tuning, body needs painting etc. but it's a beautiful car that has made "A DREAM COME TRUE". con't

can produce a trophy worthy of Triangle Chapter's legacy.


### **Dean Gets a Real Lift** By Riley Reiner

Dean Tryon has acquired a compact hoist for his garage. He provided some pictures and a write-up. It

looks like the size and function of the hoist are perfect for a home garage. Dean says, "The new hoist is

all set and actually works. Thanks to Mary and Dale for helping me get it out of the trailer and set up. The 1st photo is half up - it goes a total of 55" to the mounting pads, far higher than 9' ceiling will handle, but mechanical



When the Hoist is all the way down, flat on the floor, it is 6" high and 40" wide, so it will stay put and I can drive over it when it is not in use. The motor/pump dolly also serves to lift the front so you can move it around, but it is heavy. Normally the pump/motor will
