- 5. Mike Petersen discussed the overall judging status. Although AACA has 60,000 members, only 1000 members have been willing to judge. They obviously need help but judging has benefits for all members in learning more about their cars, club and the hobby.
- **6. Dan Fuccella** reviewed the new membership brochure developed by Tony Hantjis, Jack Agayoff and Dan.
- 7. Mike Soehnlein reviewed the new Senate bill #S820 and the fact that two of our members have been appointed to the review committee (Mike Soehnlein and Bob Safrit). This bill defines various

### **Grand National—New Bern**

The AACA Grand National Car show was held at New Bern on May 13 to 15. This is a Nationally judged show that is open to AACA Senior award winning cars that have been at Senior for one year. In the Grand National competition you have the opportunity to go through the three Grand National judging levels of 1<sup>st</sup> Junior, Senior and Preservation levels.

The Grand National was a three day event starting on Thursday with registration. The 1st Capital Region hosted the Grand National meet, provided tours of historic New Bern sites, and organized other activities during the event. The Car Show and judging was held on Saturday.



There were 517 cars entered for very competitive judging. The cars were well displayed on the streets of the city. A Grand National Judge must have 30 judging points. There were 138 judges participating on the five person judging teams. Each team judged 15 to 20 cars. The judging was difficult because all the vehicles were senior winners. Judging took about three hours.

Five members of the Triangle Chapter entered their vehicles in the competition. They all had very good results.

### **Quiz and Technical Article**

In the May newsletter I asked the question about the tire size for a 1940 Ford. Mike Soehnlein prepared a detailed response that makes a good technical article. Here is his reply.

#### May Quiz

In 1940 Carl's father purchased a 1940 Ford Victoria. It came with wide whitewall tires size 650 X15. Carl now owns the car. Over the years the tires have been replaced 5 times with various sizes of tires that looked similar. This year in his spring tune up Carl noticed the tires were weather checked. Reproduction tires were expensive at \$159 each. While shopping at Walmart he noticed some radial blackwalls tires with great tread design that would work if he could get the right size. They were priced at \$49 each. Carl would like tires that are similar circumference of the original 6.00X16 tires and very close to the same width. Which size new tire sizes should he choose?

Mike writes: "More than you ever wanted to know about tires . . . "

A 6.50 width tire equates to 165.1mm or a 165 size radial tire. The diameter on metric tires remains in inches, so the correct rim diameter remains 16 inches. The profile of tires (the part after the slash mark) defines the "width to height ratio". For example a 165/60R16 would be 165mm wide, 60% or 99mm 'high' between the rim and the ground, and have a 16" center rim diameter.

Tires do not get the mm width/profile designation unless they are lower profile than the "standard". Profile standards vary by manufacturer from mm width/82 to mm width/78. A 165/80R16 would be 132mm profile height between rim & ground. This small variation is not significant. Usually the first 'low profile' with designator is mm width/75. The profile of an original 6.50X16" tire from the 40's would be rather tall & skinny so he should purchase a 'standard' 165R16.

If he wants to consider an oversize tire, a rough rule of thumb is /5 profile for every 10/width. This will give a wider tire, but the lower profile will keep the same rolling circumference so the gearing remains unchanged and thus performance, mileage and speedometer error remain about the same. For example, if our theoretical car calls for a 165R16, he could probably safely change to a 175/75R16 or a

185/70R16. That rule of thumb is only good for about two tires sizes. Obviously, the larger tire creates a potential for clearance consideration.

Tires come from the factory for a specific rim width. A 165 would typically call for a 5 or 5.5" rim. Permissible changes are usually -.5" to +1.0". Failure to match rim width to tire manufacturer recommended width can cause tire bead failure. There is a 3rd rim designator to watch out for. Most use what is called the J bead. Thus a rim would be 5.5JX16. There are some specialty tires, such as Michelin's TWX series that cannot be used on a J rim and vice-versa. The specs (required from manufacturer) for a proposed tire has to include the preferred rim width and range it may deviate. Demand to see it.

If he is trying to replicate the 6.00X16 stated in the 2nd half of the problem, it would be a 152.4. Since metric tires are not available in other than even 5 widths, he would use a 155R16.

Regardless of size chosen, there are two other tire 'designators' he must examine. One is weight. The Ford curb weighed in at a little under 4,900 lb. Add passengers, fuel & liquids, and cargo, he needs a tire safe to about 5,750 lb. Add 15% for safety margin and this would require a minimum load rating of 98 (1653 lb. each). The other designator is speed. I don't really picture the '40 Ford at 100 mph so a speed rating of R (106 mph) should be more than adequate. Alternately, P=93mph; Q=99 mph. So following the size of 6.50R16 or 6.00R16 should be a designator such as 99R.
