My winter project, fixing nine '57 Chevy pushbutton radios is halfway complete. This was the first transistor car radio. The replacement transistor cost, \$41, is more than most of the radios.

- 1. New member Warren Daniels was present for his first meeting. Warren has a 32 Ford. Potential members Pat and Marci Allen attended their first meeting after meeting chapter members at the Nov Chick Fil-A show. They had a 56 T'Bird (since sold) and are looking for a convertible.
- 2. Membership is 85 families and the treasury is at \$4665 per Fred Harley. That will come down a bit

when expenses for the Chili-Cook off, Take Apart T maintenance, etc are paid.

- 6. Mike Soehnlein discussed the parking issue in Raleigh – see the newsletter for all the details. It has moved out of committee to the City Council and has the potential for very negative effects for old car owners. Mike needs help from our members in battling this proposal.
- 7.Bob Monkovich has developed a book with info and photos of all the club's assets as proposed at the Board meeting.
- 8. Sandra and Riley Reiner did an interesting presentation on the Vintage Tour in Oct in Fuquay Varina.

Take-A-Part T Overhauled By Denny Oestreich

The Guinness record book may not contain an entry for the Model T that has been disassembled and reassembled the most times. Perhaps the Triangle Take-A-Part T should hold that record. The Chapter has disassembled the Take-A-Part T an average of ten times a year. The past few times the T was assembled and the engine was cranked the team detected a major vibration, some slipping on the drive-away and it

would not go in reverse. There was too much shaking to ignore, even for a Model T. The experienced T drivers on the team agreed the problem must be fixed.

The decision was made last fall that repairs would be done. The shaking problem was endured for the last two or three Take-A-Part-T events. New transmission clutch surfaces were replaced earlier this year, so it was not expected they were worn. In September it was



time to start the repairs in earnest. A call went out to the Model T experts and the T was pulled into i k M е Soehnlein's garage for the first of five work sessions.

M e m b e r s participating in one or more repair solutions were: Fred Harley, Mike Soehnlein, Jim Aldrich, Don

Aikin, Bob Miller, Frank Held, Chet Butcher, Floyd Barnes, Riley Reiner and Dean Tryon. The motor and drive train were removed and the repairs were started. On first examination nothing was obvious except loose bushings in the transmission housing. This was the first problem fixed. Jim Aldrich and Frank Held machined new bushings into the transmission housing. This helped but, didn't resolve the problem.

The next part replaced was the universal joint. Slack was noted in this joint which allowed the drive shaft to move back and forward too far. While installing the drive shaft it was also noticed that the square hole in the transmission tail shaft for the square end of the drive shaft had been worn greatly. This was because the combined slack of the universal joint and the transverse spring shackles the drive shaft had been barely engaging and even slipping, wearing the hole. Fortunately the spare transmission donated by Bob Miller and de-rusted by Riley Reiner had a good replacement tail shaft.

With all the new parts installed and Take-A-Part T reassembled the T was cranked and Fred Harley took it for a test drive back to the storage container. Fred re-

ports that the Take-A– Part T drives better than ever. It drives with normal vibration in both forward and reverse gears.



The lessons learned from this repair are: 1. Look for more than one problem, and Model Ts can still be fixed when you have the right experts. Further plans for the Take-A-Part T include sand blasting and repainting the wheels red. Jim Aldrich is doing this painting.

Following Triangle Board approval Fred Harley has ordered touring caps for the Take-A-Part T team. The Caps will have Model T embroidered on them.. These caps will identify the Take-A-Part T team members. With these repairs and appearance improvements the Triangle Chapter is ready for the season.

The event featured 12 pots of chili, nine cornbreads and many desserts. Mike and Jean have been making arrangements for this annual event for 19 of the past 20 years. They are well rehearsed.



Thanks to Don Aikin, Frank Held and Ken Powell for helping Mike move his engine hoist, oil drain, containers, floor jacks and other equipment out off the four car garage space on Saturday. They cleaned up the garage floor. The tables and chairs were set up and the serving area was readied. Power cords for crock pots of chili on the work bench were connected and the table for the cornbread and dessert were set up.



Mike had started a great wood fire in the stove and

the garage was warm on a cool and windy February day. Triangle members began arriving at 1:00 am carrying their chili, cornbread, and desserts.

Sweet Curried Chili

By Mike Soehnlein

2010 Chili Cook-off winner

Ingredients:

1+ lb. ground or small diced beef *
1 medium chopped onion
To taste -- salt & pepper
1 can enchilada sauce (mild)
1 can condensed tomato soup
3 cans dark red kidney beans (drained)
1 tsp chili powder
1/8 tsp garlic salt
1/8 tsp peri-peri **
1 Tbsp dried red & green pepper flakes
3 tsp <u>sweet</u> curry powder

Brown meat, onions, salt, pepper, garlic salt & chili powder. Drain grease after browning if desired, but you will lose seasoning and flavor. Instead, use leaner meat, ground chuck, or venison.

Transfer to crock-pot. Add enchilada sauce, tomato soup, pepper flakes, peri-peri & sweet curry powder. Cook on high setting until bubbles around edges, then turn down heat to simmer rest of day. Stir and taste occasionally. If you need to increase any seasoning, the longer they cook is better. Leave out sweet curry powder and you have regular chili.

* Substitute venison or beef that has been completely trimmed of all fat and without marbling. If so, since there will be no or little fat generated by cooking, add 1¹/₂ cup beef stock or bullion. [I used courseground venison with no added suet or fat.]

** Peri-peri is an extremely hot but slow acting (not hot in the mouth) red pepper from South Africa. It can be ordered on the Internet, but you may substitute a lesser cayenne or other, increasing to desired heat level. If cayenne, start at <1 tsp as you can always increase.

Serving suggestions: Serve with homemade cornbread or biscuits.
