I have gotten it to play, but still need one tube to resolve a volume cutout problem.

Don and Karen Winstead's 442

Don and Karen Winstead joined AACA as members of the Triangle Chapter in August of this year. They have recently restored and begun to drive and show their 1972 Oldsmobile 442 convertible. The car is Viking blue with a white interior and is equipped with a dual shift gate trans-



mission selector and a 455 CU engine with functional ram air induction.

In September of 2009 Don and Karen went to a car show in Youngsville where they were admiring the cars when Don mentioned to someone that he had once owned a 1972 442 Convertible. Karen later asked, "When was the last time you talked to the man who bought your 442?" This is an opening car guys dream about. Don contacted the man to whom he had sold the 442 in 1976. The man still owned the 442. Don was able to negotiate buying it back.



Don originally purchased the car new from Thompson Cadillac Olds in Raleigh in the fall of 1971. He worked part time at Thompson's garage during his high school and Col-

lege years. Don's father also worked at the dealership as a sales manager. Don was able to convince his father to allow him to order the car with the super performance package. After ordering the car Don had to endure the long wait while he car was built at the factory and shipped to the



dealership. He continually checked the car's status to ensure it did not arrive at the dealership when he was not there. He had some concerns about his friends at the dealership taking his new car on a test drive before he had a chance do the first test drive. Don finally got the car and drove it for four years before selling. There was an understanding with the second owner that if he sold it Don



would have a change to buy it back. Luckily Don was able to negotiate a deal for the car.

Once he had reacquired the 442, he arranged to have a frame-off restoration done by Linwood Piper at his restoration shop in Wake Forest. The restoration included new paint, a new interior, a new convertible top, new chrome and many new parts under the hood. The restoration was completed between March and September of this year. Linwood was responsible for doing the restoration. Don, who has a been a parts manager for Thompson Cadillac

Olds, was responsible for buying all the parts. Many of the parts had long lead times, so Don ordered these first so the restoration team would not be waiting on parts.



The car was finished in time for Don and Karen to drive the Car to Don's 40th class reunion in late September.

On September 18 this Don and Karen entered the 2010 Youngsville car show where this idea got started. At their first car show they were awarded trophies for "Top 50" and
