Upcoming dates and activities are listed above.

For your Information:

- 1. Joe Parsons introduced a guest who plans to join AACA. Roland DiMuro (Angiers, NC) has just bought an unrestored 1968 Buick Electra convertible with only 9000 miles on it.
- 2. Fred Harley reported that membership is at 97 families.
- 3. New members include Todd and Bev Rosenburg from Oxford.
- 4. Andrea Irby has developed a new post card for the chapter to give to potential new members. She has a good supply. Let her know if you need some.
- 5. Denny reviewed the spring events and car shows:
 - Cary show had 162 cars including several members,10 judges from AACA and two "T" shows.
 - The Wake Forest show had 182 cars for their first time event and two "T" shows.
 - The watermelon social at Andrea and Cecil's house had about 6 old cars and 25 people. And, this might



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- be the start of a contest to see who has the longest car. More in the next newsletter.
- The ice cream social was held in the Reiner's new "adequate" garage with 56 in attendance.
- The Raleigh Classics at the Capital had two "T" shows and 6 members displaying cars.
- 6. Denny reviewed the Board discussion regarding our Spring show:
 - a. Our show date was changed at our May meeting to April 26, 2014.
 - b. We discussed three possible formats for our show; Regular Car Show; NC Region Show; or a Dual Region Show and Open show at Oak View.
 - c. Board discussed concerns.
 - i. Current Triangle venue recently only draws 40-50 vehicles, other venues have 60-80.
 (Note – actual number of registrations is in the range of 58-63 from 2009 to 2013 – Dean checked after the meeting)
 - ii. Other Chapters view the Raleigh venue as a difficult to reach.
 - iii. Oak view will accommodate a maximum of 80 vehicles, limited growth.
 - iv. Support AACA and Triangle "original/ restored vehicle" tradition and legacy.
 - d. Board Decision: "Hold a Regular Car Show" at Oak View in 2014. (date is April 26)
 - e. New plans and ideas discussed for future years:
 - i. Promote our show for original/restored cars, trucks, and motorcycles.
 - ii. Identify a new venue that is larger and more accessible.
 - iii. Try a new expanded Car Show format in 2015 at a new venue.
 - iv. Propose to host a larger dual Region and Open Car show in 2016.
 - v. Dean mentioned at the meeting that several years ago Fred and Dean sent letters to non-member previous year participants that generated some additional registrations.



Sensuous Steel: Day-Tripping at the Frist Center by Ronald Sieber

It all began over coffee at one of our Porsche Club of America Saturday morning gatherings. A few of us had read about the Frist Center exhibit on Art Deco automobiles, and we decided to travel to Nashville to see it. Ken Gross, former curator at the Peterson Automotive Museum in Los Angeles, had curated this show, and he was also behind the upcoming exhibit of Porsches at the North Carolina Museum of Art (NCMA) in Raleigh. We wanted to see what we would probably be getting at the NCMA in October.

We flew in as a group – Ivin Silver, Margaret Klemmer, Kevin Heimbaugh, and me. Ralph Moore,



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who was already in Nashville for a meeting, picked us up at the airport. "Guys", he said, "we've got time to kill before the Frist opens, so let's grab some breakfast at the Pancake Pantry. They've got the greatest thing – sweet potato pancakes." Ralph was

right on about this – what a way to start the day!

We pulled up to what looked like a plain old urban post office and walked inside. Boy, what a



surprise! It turns out that the Frist, which opened in 2001, was formerly the main post office for Nashville. Erected in 1934 *(and pictured above)*, it featured a gorgeous Art Deco interior emblematic of this period. Not surprisingly, it was the perfect venue to host a show of Art Deco automobiles.

The Deco movement in automobiles emerged around 1930 as a breakout from classical forms. Streamlining was all the rage, and designers freely stole ideas from aeronautic developments to add curves and swooping lines, freeing up the imposing facades and rounding off the boxy edges of the past. European designers were always at the front of the wave, and the Deco period was just one more instance in which Euro design houses showed who the leaders in design were.

The Deco movement applied simplicity and evoked artistic elements from ancient Egypt and Greece, twentieth-century Craftsman architecture, and even modernism. Combined with influence from discoveries in aero- and hydrodynamics, the shapes emerging from coachbuilders and designers broke new ground. Although coach built cars were made for the affluent, design elements also filtered down into production autos.

Ferdinand Porsche was not unaffected by the aerodynamic movement in auto design. Its influence can be seen in his Typ 64 Berlin-Rome racer, which will be the first car in the NCMA exhibit. The rest of the Porsche lineup, beginning with the Erwin Komenda-designed 1949 Typ 356 Gmund coupe, continued and refined this trend that had been a whimsy in the Art Deco era. By the 1960s, automobile aerodynamics were data-driven,

scientific study.

Eighteen automobiles and two motorcycles were chosen for the Frist exhibit. Their background and influence were presented in the vehicle posters that accompanied each auto.

Two examples stood out as related to the designs

from Porsche that emerge in this same decade, as seen in the following photos.





T150C (*pictured above*), *b*uilt by designers Figoni & Falaschi, was a sensation at the 1938 New York Auto Salon. One even competed in the 1938 LeMans and placed third.

The 1938 DuBonnet, (pictured below) designed



by Jean
Andreau,
was built on
a HispanoSuiza
chassis by
Jacques
Saoutchik.

It featured a hydrodynamic suspension and a sliding-track door, both invented by DuBonnet, France's aperitif baron

Our day in Nashville was short but intense. We left excited about what would be in store for us at the North Carolina Museum of Art. Their exhibit, **Seducing Speed: Porsche By Design**, will run from October 13, 2013 through January 20, 2014.

Sealed Beam Headlights By Mike Petersen

The Antique Automobile Club of America (AACA) national judging currently does not accept halogen sealed beam headlights on vehicles which were not delivered with halogen sealed beam headlights or were built before halogen sealed beam headlights became available.

This article is a summary of an investigation on the current availability of sealed beam headlights which are not branded "HALOGEN" on the lens. These are needed to avoid AACA national judging deductions for vehicles which were not delivered with halogen sealed beam headlights or were built before halogen sealed beam headlights became available.

Summary of findings:

There are sufficient options for new sealed beam headlights without the "HALOGEN" brand on the lens to afford the hobbyist sources for new sealed beam headlights which may be non-halogen or halogen but not look like halogen sealed beam headlights. The actual brand used on the vehicle (Sylvania, GE, Westinghouse, etc.) may not be available as a new item. However, the sealed beam brand is not a factor in AACA national judging. A halogen sealed beam headlight that is not branded "HALOGEN" and in which the bulb does not look like a halogen bulb is like a battery that looks period correct but is actually a spiral wound gel battery. If the battery looks period correct then it is accepted as correct – no deduction for being modern inside the battery case.

Details:

I looked at sealed beam headlights in an Advance Auto Parts Store. The 7" 12V Sylvania halogen sealed beam headlights were branded "SYLVANIA PERFORMANCE" and did not look like halogen sealed beam headlights. The 5 3/4" 12V Sylvania halogen sealed beam headlights were branded "SYLVANIA HALOGEN" and, because of the brand, would look like halogen sealed beam headlights. It is possible that other sources (Auto Zone, NAPA, Pep Boys, Walmart, online vendors) have these and perhaps other brands with, or without, the "HALOGEN" brand on the lens.

I looked at NOS sealed beam headlights (both 6V and 12V) on eBay and found guite a few nonhalogen NOS sealed beam headlights that may meet the needs of a hobbyist.

There are many vendors who sell what is called a "Semi Sealed Beam Headlight" (both 6V and 12V). The lens looks like a non-halogen sealed beam. The lens is not branded "HALOGEN". The back of the headlight has a regular electrical connector (2 or 3 prong) to plug into the original wiring harness. However, this connector is part of a halogen bulb connector that can be removed for halogen bulb replacement just like a modern vehicle with halogen headlight bulbs. It is possible that one could look through the lens and see the halogen bulb (some have a gray cap on the bulb). The hobbyist interested in this type of sealed beam to look like a non-halogen sealed beam headlight should look at it closely before purchasing the unit.

I communicated with three restoration companies. They did not know of any specific suppliers of sealed beam headlights which were non-halogen or halogen that looked like non-halogen. However, they did not recall any difficulties in obtaining the sealed beam headlights desired by the customers.

There are several vendors who carry "WAGNER" branded sealed beam headlights that are nonhalogen. In some cases the halogen sealed beam headlight lens is not branded "HALOGEN". Some of the vendors have sealed beam headlights with no brand at all (which should be accepted for AACA national judging).

A list of available products is included in this newsletter as a separate flyer. Keep it handy as a reference.
