Barry and Dian also loved VMCCA Touring, having attended the 2005 Western National in Kanab, Utah and the Chrome Glidden Tour along the length of the Blue Ridge Parkway.

Barry's daughter Heather describes him as "honest, loving, kind, humble, generous, protective, strong, and completely selfless...", and adds " No more cancer, no more chemo, no more pills, no more pain." ... to which I add AMEN!

I'll admit it. The first time I saw the Ford Mustang, I stumbled around, drooled on myself, and babbled incoherently. But then again, I was only 18 months old. Yes folks, it's been fifty years since the Mustang first hit the road. For perspective, when the Mustang was introduced in 1964, the start of World War I was fifty years in the rearview mirror. The history of the Ford Mustang is so well-known I won't go into it. Instead, I'll share the story of my 1966 Mustang GT coupe, the first *running* car I ever owned.

My first foray into mechanized transportation

The Mustang was not my first foray into mechanized transportation, however. That would be a motorcycle. For some reason my 51 year-old brain can no longer recall, my 19 year-old brain thought that a two-wheeled vehicle with no protection against the elements or other drivers was the *perfect* solution to my transportation needs. In any case, the year I owned a motorcycle also turned out to be one of the coldest and wettest winters on record. I learned to drink coffee because of my motorcycle – I would buy the cheapo coffee from the vending machines just so I could hold the cup in my hands until they thawed out enough to let me take notes in class.

By early 1982, I was a sophomore at the University of Georgia and I was thinking maybe a motorcycle wasn't the best idea. But how could I get into a car without admitting

defeat and facing the "I told you so" look of my parents? Then the solution hit me – or more precisely, a sorority girl in her father's battleship-sized Chrysler hit me. As I lay in the middle of the intersection of Milledge Avenue and Baxter Street, with the girl's sorority sisters running *past* me to see if *she* was alright (I kid you not), I remember thinking to myself, "I think it's time to get a car." The girl's insurance company ended up "buying" what was left of the motorcycle, and I was on the hunt for four wheels.

Not love at first sight ...

My dad Cecil Jr. had always had an interest in getting some kind of collector car to tinker with, but like so many of his generation, family obligations wouldn't allow any such indulgence. At one time, he had thought about getting a Corvair, but by the time I was looking for a car we had a family friend who played with old Mustangs. And so we were steered in that direction. In retrospect, I could just as easily driven down the "Bowtie" path as the "Blue Oval" one.

I first saw my particular car at a local Mustang show car corral, but I wasn't too impressed at the time. The car had clearly been "rode hard and put up wet" by a long series of inexperienced and inattentive drivers. It wore an amateur paint job in a non-stock red color that showed drips, sags and orange peel, as well as the usual scratches and small dings. The left quarter panel had a damaged area that had started to rust, and the vinyl top was beginning to fray in places.

But the car also had some features which set it apart. It was a true factory GT, which meant it had the four-barrel V8, front disc brakes, fog lights, and trumpet exhausts (or at least the holes where they had been). The car also had factory air conditioning and the deluxe interior, which featured sporting horses galloping across the seatbacks and "wood grain appliqué" on the instrument cluster and glove box (my best friend at the time referred to it as "burled peckerwood"). After shopping around for a few



weeks, my dad and I finally got back in touch with the seller, and agreed on \$1300 for the once-proud pony. The picture at the end the next page shows a skinnier version of me in 1982, proudly displaying the car for one of my friends.

...but in the end, love is blind....

Once the car was actually *mine*, all of its earlier perceived faults fell away and overnight *my* Mustang became the fastest, best-looking, coolest vehicle that had ever existed. Of course there were a few things that weren't perfect and I went about "restoring" the car as best I could on a student budget. Since the interior was black vinyl, I was able to use black electrical tape to make satisfactory repairs to the various tears in the seats. A piece of paneling from the family basement nicely matched the "wood grain applique" in the rest of the car, and so made for a dandy replacement package tray. The AC compressor might not have worked, but I could still roll up the windows, turn the fan on in the under dash unit, and at least create the illusion of cool air blowing around the car. The windows rattled, the heater box gave off a coolant smell, and the paint looked like it had been applied with a brush. But hey, she was mine! And she served me well as my primary transportation for three years.

The Mustang - the later years

After college I started working for IBM and bought my first new car (a 1985 Saab 900). While she still owned my heart, the Mustang spent most of her time in the garage. She then shared space in my parent's garage when I was in the PhD program at Chapel Hill from 1988 to 1992. More years passed, and suddenly it was 1996 – I was living in Chapel Hill with my first wife Donna and our one-year-old son, Philip. I knew it was time to start thinking about restoring the Mustang properly.

I won't go through all the details of the restoration.

Suffice it to say it was true "ground-up" project with the goal of taking the car back to original while still maintaining

drivability. I took care of the mechanics, while Frank Gibson of Gibson Autoworks did the body work and Auto Interiors and Tops of Raleigh did, well, the interior and top. By 2001, "Grace" was back on the road, resplendent in her original color of Tahoe Turquoise and dealer accessory wire wheel covers. I showed Grace for a couple years, winning a Gold Award in the Mustang Club of America's Concours Driver class, prior to retiring her from show duty. Now, Grace and I go out regularly together when the weather is good, and we have accumulated more than 40K miles since her restoration. In 2010 Grace and I welcomed a new member into the family, Andrea. Neither seems to be jealous of the other and in fact

they are like sisters.

My son Philip is now grown up, and much to my surprise, took a scholarship to attend my alma mater, the University of Georgia. Philip's car is a

2001 Volvo V40 – more modern, reliable and safer, but alas, nowhere near as cool as the Mustang. So last fall, Andrea and I drove Grace down



to Athens and took Philip back to where I had my first picture taken with Grace. Our recreation of the original picture is shown above.. So really, who looks cooler, Philip or his old man?
