The Summer Time Adventures of Jim and Becky By Jim Aldrich

Becky and I took off this summer in our 1920 Dodge (pictured below) and participated in the week long Dodge Brothers Tour in June. The car is a former Detroit police car and a true barn find. I have had the car in storage for eight years. Brian White and Fred Harley helped us get it running.



The tour was based near Detroit, Michigan. It honored the lives and work of John and Horace Dodge, brothers who helped shape the Detroit auto industry in the early 1900s. 2014 is the centennial anniversary of the first Dodge rolling off the assembly line.

We visited the Gilmore Museum in Hickory Corners, MI and the Walter P. Chrysler Museum in Auburn Hills. There were 300 people and more than 100 cars on the tour! Busses took us to the Gilmore, but all other stops were by antique vehicle.



The tour culminated with a car show and dinner at Meadow Brook Hall, the Dodge family home. Meadow Brook Hall is site of the former



Concours D'Elegance that is now known as the Concours of America at St. Johns. Meadow Brook



Hall is a beautiful estate (pictured left and below) with 39 different chimneys. Most importantly, it is home to a new, permanent Dodge museum.



Afterwards, we spent a week at our Michigan farm where Becky helped me paint the kitchen for my birthday. It was a grand adventure all around.



2014 Concours of America at St. Johns By Rob and Barbara VanDewoestine

This event is the successor to the Meadowbrook Concours and is held at the St. Johns Inn and Golf Resort in Plymouth, Michigan. There are not many conference centers and golf courses that come complete with a chapel and bell tower built in Italian Renaissance style, but this reflects the fact that the original purpose of the facility was for the education of Catholic priests.



The hotel is on the left with the chapel and bell tower on the right. There are several religiously themed contemplation gardens on the grounds.

This year's Concours included 280 cars displayed on four fairways of the 27-hole golf course. One of the features of this event were cars that came from the period when Virgil Exner ran the design studio at Chrysler in the 1950's and 60's.

Exner's automobile design career began under Harley Earl at GM in the late 1930's where he did design work on Pontiacs. He moved to Lowey and Associates to do work for Studebaker but then left to work directly for Studebaker with responsibility for their post-war cars. Exner finally moved to Chrysler's Advanced Design Group in 1949. The "fins" that GM put on the rear fenders of the 1948 Cadillac's caught Exner's eye and they began to be incorporated into Chrysler's Forward Look in 1955. Chrysler's "Suddenly its 1960" campaign in 1957 brought fins into full flower along with lowering the lines of the new vehicles. Exner believed that the fins (Chrysler called them stabilizers) improved the aerodynamics of the vehicles and had some wind tunnel testing to back up that view. Certainly a fin would add a little down force and move the center of drag toward the real of a vehicle.

The red 1961 Plymouth in the group (pictured below, left of our car) was completely original except for the convertible top. It is hard to believe that a car regularly driven in all weather in Ohio could look this good. The car was brought by a

woman who is the daughter of the original owner.

who was an automotive designer in his own right, led a discussion on Saturday that included panelists that were either current or former designers for Ford, GM and Chrysler. Exner was then also one of the judges for the show on Sunday.

There were two classes with Exner cars. One had 15 cars from 1955-1961 with all marques produced by Chrysler. The cars were arranged in a circle around a tree facing outward on one of the golf course fairways. Ropes were set up around each group of cars that prevented spectators from doing much more that looking at the front. We had run into this format at one other event and do not care for it. It certainly means a lot less risk for the cars, but restricts owner interactions with attendees and does not allow a good view of car interiors.

Organizers had allowed placement of the cars on the show field Saturday afternoon to avoid congestion Sunday morning. Of course that then leads to dealing with wet car covers so it is always good to have someone on the team who can do that.



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Judging was surprisingly informal with no looking in the trunk or even under the hood. There were no requests to start engines and check that all the functions on the car were in order. On the other hand, fraternization with the judges (in this case Virgil Exner, Jr.) seemed to be encouraged.

Even though the judges did not look under hoods there were some magnificently finished engine compartments. Below is one on a 1957 Chrysler 300C that had been brought from Connecticut.

There was a second Virgil Exner class that had 6 Chrysler Imperials from 1957-60.



The logistics of the event were well done with trailer parking at a school less than 2 miles from the show field. Sponsors put on a breakfast, lunch and supper for event participants. The weather was a bit threatening for Sunday but a heavy rain held off until most of us were under cover. Barbara and I had our Plymouth in the trailer with at least ten seconds to spare.

Two of the featured vehicles were the Chrysler show cars. The first was the two passenger



1960 Plymouth XNR (pictured above) that had once been owned by the Shaw of Iran. It was built on a modified Valiant chassis with a high performance version of the Chrysler slant-6 engine putting out 250 HP and was reportedly capable of a 150 MPH top speed. The body is steel and was fabricated by Ghia in Italy. Everything but the headlights was asymmetric.



The second show vehicle was the 1956 Chrysler Diablo.

Its body was also fabricated by Ghia but on a Chrysler 300 chassis of 129 inch wheel base. It started life as the "Dart" but a couple of revisions turned it into the Diablo. It is an operational vehicle with a 392 cubic inch V-8 turning out 375 HP. Wind tunnel tests showed an amazingly low coefficient of drag of 0.17. Power went to the rear wheels through a Torque-Flite 3 speed transmission with push button controls.

Cecil Bozarth and Andrea Irby were supposed to join us as cheerleaders but they took a trip overseas. I hate to tell them, but they truly missed out!
