100 + Years of Progress by Denny Oestreich

Patti Eder invited Triangle members to demonstrate the Take A Part T at their annual "100+ Years of Progress" open house and tractor event at their home and business in Carthage, NC. The event was held on November 8, 2014 and, as usual, had thousands of visitors on the show weekend. Many Triangle members attended as part of the Brass Nickel tour. We were also delighted to see Triangle member **Dan Stamm** driving his Corvair to the show. The Eder's are continually acquiring tractors and trucks to add to their already impressive collection, so it is always interesting to see what they have added each year.

The Triangle Chapter organized a team of twelve members to do the Take-A-Part T demonstrations. George Ashley towed the Take-A-Part T to and from the show. Other members of the team who assisted with the Take-A-Part T demonstration were; Riley Reiner, Don Aikin, Grady Connor, Marv Gage, Gary Hunter, Floyd Barnes, Dan Morton, Jack Agayoff, Jim Gill, Ken Powell, and Denny Oestreich. Patti Eder set the T show in their front yard under the trees. We were near the sawmill, the blacksmith, the chain saw carver, and the outdoor cooking display.

We performed two Take-A-Part demonstrations. The first show was our tune up demonstration. We finished in 8 minutes. Not a bad for a tune up. The best news is that the T started easily.

The second demonstration in the afternoon took longer. The assembly started off well, but we had trouble with the drive shaft to transmission

connection. The square peg would not line up to go into the square hole and the transmission bolts kept getting caught in the coupling cover. This required repositioning the engine several times. The engine got heavier and heavier with each reposition and there were some complaints from the assembly line workers. At last, we were able to reposition the drive shaft correctly and finish in a new record longest time of over 11 minutes. Again the engine started, and Jim Gill was finally able to drive it off.
