

# St. Michaels Concours Photos and Story By Rob VanDewoestine

The town of St. Michaels is on the eastern shore of Chesapeake Bay in an area that has long been a center of the oyster and fishing industries. It is now more a center for tourism and has an excellent Maritime Museum (<a href="http://www.cbmm.org/">http://www.cbmm.org/</a>) that was the site of the Concours last year.

The Concours at St. Michaels is in its seventh year. To improve logistics, the event was moved 20 miles south to the Hyatt Regency Chesapeake Bay in Cambridge, MD. Like other events of this nature, it is a fundraiser for the Mid-Shore Community Foundation.

There was a sponsored welcome reception Friday evening and then a tour into the attractions in St. Michaels on Saturday. About half the cars in the show participated in the tour and it was an excellent opportunity to see some classic vehicles in motion. Most of the participants were from Maryland, Virginia and New Jersey, but a unique Allard J2X was entered

from Chicago. The Allards were British sports cars that were fitted with American V -8 engines. Fewer than 100 of this model were made and this 1950 model (pictured right) is the only one with full front fenders. It has a Cadillac 331 cubic inch engine as in many of



the originals. When new it was used as an automotive technology test bed by The Battelle Institute but then left to rust until saved last year.

There was a fundraising dinner and auction Saturday evening. The auction was a lot of the usual types of things with one exception. There were 4 VIP tickets to the Tonight Show and then a tour of Jay Leno's garage. Jay does not conduct the tour himself but is usually around to greet the people who have bought the tickets.

The Concours was held on a beautiful Sunday morning on the 18<sup>th</sup> fairway of the golf course right next to the hotel. Trailer parking was about a half mile away. The number of cars was rather small, being limited to 48 vehicles. The organizers kept the field small for the first

event in the new venue to make sure that the logistics did not become a problem.



The cars (pictured above) were arranged facing each other in an arc on the airway. There was enough sun to make the cool breeze coming off the Bay welcome in the afternoon.

Just as accessories can make the woman, they

can also add a great deal to a classic car. Pictured right is a 1955 Mercedes-Benz 300SL with fitted luggage. Using every cubic inch of trunk space made this



Mercedes actually practical for touring.

A large group of "woodies" was assembled for the show. This 1948 Chrysler Town and Country (pictured below) is an example of the quality of



the original construction and a very good restoration complete with a "Highlander" interior.

There was a good representation of European cars with several Jaguars, Mercedes and Rolls-Royces. The Rolls –Royce foundation had brought an unrestored chassis so that the complicated running gear could be seen easily.

A restored example (pictured below) of a Rolls was a 1936 Phantom III Drophead Coupe. It has a 7.3 liter 12-cylinder engine producing a very conservative 160 horsepower. It was brought to



the US in 1956 and given a preservation restoration in 2010. It was bodied by Freestone & Webb in 1936 and has the spare tire mounted on the trunk rather than the more conventional side mount.

The cars were on the show field by 9:00 Sunday morning and the judging started promptly at 9:30. There were 7 teams of 2 judges so that judging was finished by 10:30 and entrants could relax and look at other cars. The logistics of this event were conducted very well and right on schedule. The sponsors provided two breakfasts and then lunch and a supper on Sunday.

The awards ceremony started promptly at 3:00 with the first and second place cars in each class driving up the fairway to receive their awards. The two winners in our class were a Cord 1930 L-29 convertible and a 1931 Franklin 151 convertible. Barbara and I were sitting in our car enjoying the day, watching the winners drive by and getting ready to drive back to our trailer when one of the officials came up and asked me to start the engine. When I asked why, he was a little vague. We found out about a minute later that our Cord was announced as the winner of the Best of Show award! We had our pictures taken with the Bay in the background and received a very classy cast aluminum trophy fabricated by one of the show's organizers.
