The meeting was an extremely interesting discussion on the new Tesla electric car by Trevor Smith and others from the local dealership/service center off Westgate Rd. in Raleigh. For all the details and to see the videos he showed, go to <u>www.teslamotors.com</u>. The original roadster came out in 2008 replaced by the Model S in 2012. They have built 38,000 cars so far and ramping up to build about 40,000/year. Not bad for a \$70,000+ car. It goes 0-60 MPH in about 4.2 sec (the high performance version) with the low performance version taking an incredibly slow 5.4 sec. Range is 230-300 miles per the standard EPS test. Two vehicles were available in the parking lot to check out. The Take-A-Part T demonstrations were organized by **Riley Reiner** and went well with times under seven minutes. **Jack Agayoff** was Chief Judge and organized the judging teams. **Riley Reiner** organized the final Plaque assembly. **Dan Morton** sold the most raffle tickets <u>ever</u> for the bucket of *Majestic Solutions* detailing products.

Thanks to everyone who brought the goodies for the hospitality tent and to Eastern Star who sold Chick-fil-A sandwiches, hot dogs, and drinks.

Dan Fuccella coordinated two Youth Judging team training sessions where several youngsters



were outfitted with judging caps, T-Shirts, and judging forms. These young judges learned a little about judging and even involved their parents.

The award plaques were well received. The Best in Show Trophy was awarded by the judges to **Reggie Hiner** and his **1922 Dodge Brothers Delivery Truck** (pictured below).



After the show, Triangle members disassembled the tent and gathered the tables and signs to be loaded back onto Dan Morton's trailer. The Take-Apart T was loaded on the trailer and a caravan returned everything to storage.

Thanks to all the Triangle Chapter members I did not mention who volunteered to make the show a success. Our event was well organized this year and we were prepared to accommodate many more cars. With a total of 49 cars on the show field, we had one less entry than last year. In spite of moving the car show date one week earlier so we would not compete with the Pinehurst Concours, advertising, and opening up entries for custom and special interest vehicles, we continued to see declining entries. We suspect the major reasons for low entries is due to competing car shows on the same day and a reduced interest in preservation and originality of AACA vehicles and more interest in modified and custom vehicles. *What do you think?*

(*Editor's note:* Lake Wheeler also moved their car show date from a year ago. It was held at the same time as our show, advertised on the radio and only ten minutes away)

Iron Mike Run Story by Les Tryon and Joe Parsons Pictures by Andrea Irby and Joe Parsons

The first part of any Concours is an optional tour on the Friday of the big weekend event. Participating is fun and offers an extra point which could be helpful in the event of a tie on show day. At the Pinehurst Concours d' Elegance, the tour has an extra special meaning and purpose. Concours entrants leave from Pinehurst and make the trek to Fort Bragg to allow soldiers and their families to see many of the Concours cars on their own parade field. The trip also familiarizes Concours entrants to the distinctive service and activities of those who protect us.

Our day at Fort Bragg started with a street show in front of Carolina Inn (pictured below) where townspeople and Pinehurst visitors had a chance see

some of the cars, take pictures and converse with the owners. It was overcast most of the day but the ten drops of rain did not hurt anything. We were escorted all the way to our spot on



the Fort Bragg Parade Field where we were served a wonderful lunch under two huge tents. There were the usual "Thank Yous" and presentations on the program which also included Miss North Carolina singing the National Anthem surrounded by her court. The 82nd Airborne chorus performed twice with a mix of songs and some dance moves which at times brought tears to some eyes.

were able to visit displays of the many facets of a base- uniforms and the extremely heavy pack, helmet and vest our soldiers wear in the course of their duty. Another tent displayed the artillery with an explanation of how it works. A mock-up of a MASH unit was interesting. So many soldiers, families and other personnel visited the displays and it was great to have the possibility to ask questions of all.

Some of us, like Joe Parsons, had a soldier ride along with them to the base. There were ten soldiers in all and <u>each</u> was a purple heart recipient. Some of them were very young and it was amazing all that they had accomplished so far in their careers. The introductions of the men at the pre-run briefing would astound anyone and yet each soldier was humble and modest.

The stories shared between entrant and soldier are special. Last year, Joe participated in the Inaugural Iron Mike Run with his 1958 Goldenhawk and was so moved by his experience that he joined the USO volunteer group at RDU airport. Quoted in an April Concours news article produced by Droschak Communications, Joe noted: "I really felt the need to do something for the servicemen," Parsons said. "I feel it is rewarding. Being involved in the relationship with Fort Bragg is just a distinct honor. All of the Concours across the country have charities but I don't see anything that can come close to what the Pinehurst Concours does for the military."

This year, Joe met Eric Thompson, a trilingual specialist with multiple tours across Afghanistan, Iraq (twice), Jordan and Bosnia. Eric is Jump Master Qualified with 90 jumps to his credit. Because of his linguistic skills, Eric works in Civil Affairs when deployed. He has been in the Army

for 20 years and just re-enlisted for another four.

Eric was so moved by the experience of the day that he gave Joe his camouflage hat from his time in Afghanistan. (pictured right). It was a special day for all involved.



On the way back, there was an unexpected moment when two black hawk helicopters came up over the horizon toward the parade of Concours cars heading back to Pinehurst. It was unplanned, unexpected and a rare treat for entrants. Even Concours organizers were in awe. The fleeting but memorable moment was captured by SportsCenter-Digest as the Tryons and "Woody" climbed a hill. The helicopter pilots probably wanted their own special view of the Iron Mike Run... And they got it!
