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## 2015 International Car Show by Denny Oestreich

Three members of the Triangle Chapter participated in the 2015 International Car show at the NC State Fairgrounds February 12-15. The show is sponsored by the New Car Dealers Association and provides new cars on exhibit for the public to compare. You can sit in the newest Lexus or climb up into the cab of a super truck. There was even an opportunity to line up for a test drive in a 6.2 liter fluorescent green Dodge Challenger. The window stickers indicated most vehicles were highly optioned with prices at just under \$50,000. The lowest price window sticker I saw was a was a Kia at \$14,470. The highest was a very nice four seat Ferrari at slightly over \$343,000. In between at \$65,000 and \$80,000 were the SUVs which cost more than our first house.

There were only a couple of concept cars on display and a few special interest vehicles. I was impressed with Dale Earnhardt Junior's show car. The gas lines, to and from the gas tank, were 3/4 in pipes. No wonder they need to stop for fuel so often. I also

climbed up into the seats of several new trucks to see which fit me. You certainly have a good view from up there. Many people were thumping the new Ford




Truck. I was looking for a new truck, but did not find a vehicle in my price range.

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## **Amelia Island Preparations**

## Quick Thinking By Mike Peterson

This is a story from a collection of hobby stories. With a bit of luck this situation became a funny story and not a tragic event. Please be careful when preparing to go to a meet.

I had prepared my car for a car show near my home and was relaxing when the telephone rang. A friend of mine who had traveled to the car show was stranded in the city and needed a coil for his '55 Dodge. It was 10:30 PM. "No problem. I will get a spare and be there in 2 hours."

It was raining and my car was ready for the show. I backed the car out of the garage just enough so I could lower the attic stairs in the garage ceiling and retrieve the coil. Within minutes I had the coil in my hand, the stairway put back, and I was ready to pull my '55 Dodge back in the garage. Only a small part of the trunk lid and rear got wet from the rain.

I got into the '55 Dodge and turned the key. Nothing happened, the car was dead. I figured it must be the solenoid. This was no big deal because the solenoid is mounted on the inner fender and can be easily bypassed to start the car.

As I got out my jumper cable I mused to myself as to the coincidence that my friend's coil and my solenoid would fail within hours of each other.

I turned on the ignition in the '55 Dodge, put a fender cover on the fender, and bypassed the solenoid with the jumper cable. As the car started to crank and I worked the accelerator linkage I figured I would be on the road in just a few minutes to rescue my friend.

What happened next was in slow motion just like the movies. The engine fired up and the '55 Dodge started to burn rubber.
