at the show he noticed that Lillard was also there and already looking at the Safari. After a thorough review of Warren's work, Lillard gave his approval. Warren also received a First in Class award from the show judges. Word has it this is an excellent restoration that could go on to national awards.

9. Mary's Banana Split Pie by Mary Gilliam

Hello and thanks to all who participated in the Ice Cream Social that was held in July. Johnny and I really enjoyed the mouthwatering ice cream and all the yummies shared in such a short time. I was asked to share my Banana Split Pie recipe I brought. *Thanks for sharing it with us, Mary.*

Mary's Banana Split Pie (9 x 13 pyrex dish works great)

First Layer.

- 2 cups graham cracker crumbs
- 1 stick melted butter

Press well into pyrex dish going up the sides also. Bake 5 minutes at 375 degrees. Cool well. Second Layer.

- 2 cups powdered sugar
- 2 sticks butter
- 2 eggs
- 1 tsp. vanilla

Beat this on high with mixer non-stop for 20 minutes!!! This will taste like ice cream once it is ready to serve.

Third Layer:

1 can crushed pineapple in own juice (20 oz). Drain well - but save juice.

Fourth Layer:

Split four large bananas lengthwise, add 1 Tbsp. lemon juice to the reserved pineapple juice and dip bananas into this.

Fifth Layer:

Use large Cool Whip -- Sprinkle well with broken pecan pieces and I use about 15 maraschino cherries to top off the pieces I am going to cut. It makes about 15 good sized pieces.

Just layer all this as directed and leave in fridge for at least 24 hours to get VERY cold but not frozen. Cut into nice squares to serve. Enjoy!!
