Two months later, the STS came in exactly what I wanted. Fortunately, the dealer took the coupe in on trade and on November 22, 1992, I had a 2 year old STS with 54,000 miles on it.

Today, the car has 287,000 on the same engine and transmission. Lots of typical repairs over the years on this daily driver. The unique thing about this car (never tried before or since) is the interior is 95% covered in leather, even the door panels! There is an extensive amount of burled wood on the doors, dash, gear shift and rear console. Not just small pieces but full panels. Everyone marvels at the inside when they see it." *Hopefully, we will see it at our Spring show!*

Denny Oestreich gave me the name of Ultimate Glass Works to contact. I also read a referral from a man who had his Corvette glass repaired and it was very positive. So I called Ultimate and made an appointment for them to come to my house ... correct he came to my house!

Billy arrives and looks the my Hawk windshield and I showed him the two pieces of stainless trim that I needed to replace. Billy said there could be a chance of the glass breaking but the rubber was good and flexible and not glued into the frame. He said he thought he could remove the glass in the existing rubber. I said ok, let's do it.

He covered the seat and removed the wiper arms. I had already removed the garish moldings inside. With a unique tool he proceeded to remove the entire glass with the rubber from inside the car. He made it look so easy. I had replacement rubber repo but he was able to save the existing rubber.

He removed the two pieces of stainless and installed the show quality stainless. Then with a

cord here reinstalled the entire glass in the rubber perfectly.
