82nd AACA Annual Meeting—Philadelphia PA

After being a member of the AACA since 2014, I finally attended my first Annual Meeting in Philly. However, since the Eagles won the Super Bowl—beating the Patriots!! - I didn't know what to expect in the relm of people. Fortunately, most people had already left by the time I got there at 8am Friday, February 9.

I flew in early Friday and went straight to my first seminar, "Region & Chapter Leadership, Training & Development." This seminar was held by a few members and also Colby Martin from SEMA, who spoke about the need to contact our legislatures regarding changes in laws for our classics and antique cars. You can sign up to receive updates to our state by going to www.SEMASan.com. I signed up and I engourage you to also! We want to protect this hobby we love so much and need to help make sure laws aren't passed that will keep us from doing what we love.

Another big topic was getting young people interested in the hobby! A few members talked about their success with doing displays with the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts and bringing a couple of cars to display and talk about. Some Chapters even help them get their Mechanics Merit badge!

Has anyone thought of participating in a Slot Car racing event? I hadn't, but what better place to display a few cars then at an event which features the most primal of vehicles! Do you know of one in the area? Let us know!

This Halloween, how about we set up a Trunk-or-Treat? I've done this before and it's a load of fun! Don't know what it is? Well, you get a group of cars together in a parking lot and have them parked with the trunk or pickup bed pointed into the middle of the lot. You decorate your vehicle and hand out candy to the kids! It's a fun and

safe event for everyone!

The next Seminar I attended was American Racing Cars 1895-1953. I wanted to attend this class as I've never had the opportunity to see the racecars being evaluated at a national event because it's usually on a Friday and I'm either doing something, on a tour, or just not at the event location.

I learned that these cars are Certified Only. They use original parts or parts from their era—just like a show car. They must be presented as in their particular time and date and the era must be defined. In other words, you can't show a 1935 race car with 1982 parts. "Fake" cars are not allowed, meaning, you can't "make-up" a race car. They have to be a car that was established and raced and have documentation to show this.

The vehicle must be certified by AACA Committee before it can go to a National Event. To do so, a form must be filled out and sent in with two photos of the vehicle.

If a car is damaged in an accident or fire, the chassis MUST be used on the rebuilt vehicle. You can't take parts off of the original car, junk the chassis and put a new chassis on the new vehicle as there is the chance that someone can take that junk chassis, rebuild it and show it as the same vehicle. This goes back to "you can't have a "fake" vehicle". The original chassis must be kept by you. The theory is "body parts and engines changed all the time in race cars, but the chassis stayed the same."

Once the race car is Certified by the Committee, the Field Judges can then see it on the show field. However, the Team Captain can question if there are noticeable changes to the vehicle from when it was Certified. And he/she will talk to the owner and call in the Chief Judge. Everything on the vehicle must be documents. However, "Road Rash" is ok.

After a boxed lunch, I attended the "Publications" seminar. I wanted to learn more about what other Chapters and Regions are doing to make their Newsletters amazing and also about the Review Process to receive a National Award!

What the Review Team looks for is an interesting newsletter, that contains information about the club, it's members, an extensive calendar, some great articles, contact information for Officers, lots of great photos and captions.

I learned about how diligent I must be when putting any articles and photos in our newsletter that weren't provided to me by the author or photographer! (Last month, I put a great photo of an old truck with "Caption This!" as the quote—I can't do that again unless I have permission from the photographer/owner of the image. It seems that some Chapters have been sued by using an image that wasn't theirs!! I never want us to get into any trouble, so I will be quite diligent from now on. But if you have an old photo from your family, please send it to me for future use!

With the changes I've made to our newsletter in 2018, I hope to comply and be active in the Review Process and maybe, just maybe, receive a National Award!

I then attended the "Webmaster's Forum" seminar. Again, I wanted to see what's being discussed, what's required by National to receive a National Award (Which our own Denny Oestreich won three awards in 2017!!)

They look at how interesting the website is, how much current information is shared, and how easy it is to navigate.

After a brief rest in my room, I was honored to attend the Region & Chapters President's Dinner with Jim Gill Friday night. Approximately 180 members were in attendance and the dinner/meeting was opened by 2017 AACA National President, Tom Cox.

Lars Anderson, AACA VP of Llibrary and research Center, talked about the library, moving into the new building and the help they need to get things completed in the current library. Lars asked for members to come volunteer for even one day! So if you're in the Hershey area, stop into Headquarters and see any of the librarians and offer your help!

Lars opened the microphone to allow Presidents and/or representatives to come to the stage, introduce themselves and make a donation to the Library and the new building fund! Almost \$50,000 was donated!!! The next day, one family made a \$100.000 donation alone!!

2018 AACA National President, Chuck Crane was introduced. Chuck and his wife have recently moved to western North Carolina, so hopefully we'll get a chance to see him in Charlotte, at the National Meet or even at the NC Region Spring meet!

On Saturday, the real work and learning began! I took Judge's school first thing in the morning and received a beautiful Judging Chip! There were no CJE's offered, but I had been invited by Roger Irland, 2017 VP of Judging, to attend the Chief Judge's Seminar. I will be working alongside our own Mike Petersen as Assistant Chief judge of the 2018 Winter Meet in Alabama and I needed to learn how the system works, duties and responsibilities that we will be in charge of. I'm really looking forward to putting this new knowledge to the test in the next few weeks and while in Mobile AL in March.

Lastly, I attended the AACA General Membership Meeting where the financial side of the club was discussed. The one thing that stands out the most to me is that we are very fortunate to be able to move Headquarters into the new building, located on the AACA Fall meet in Hershey. And that the club has over \$5 million in assets and is completely debt free! This blew me out of the water! I'm so proud to be a part of this club.
