

BOARD MEETING MINUTES

Triangle Chapter Board Meeting 2024 – Minutes

Welcome and thank you to all and especially the new members for your support of the club.

Jim Gill called the meeting to order at 1:25.

Open Meeting

VP Report- The club will continue to meet monthly at Backyard Bistro; generally good feedback on the food, facility and service. One issue is that we tend to go long and hold up the staff closing. Given that we enjoy the time together, the board preferred to start the meeting earlier at 2:00 rather than rush.

Action- Dan- February meeting will be at 3:00, but Dan to poll the group about the feasibility of a 2:00pm earlier start.

In the search for speakers, a couple of topics came up including insurance (Hagerty speaker?) Antique vehicle Registration (?). Feb meeting – continue Q&A about Hershey. Future meeting Tom Pruett and Denny Oestreich on the Barrett-Jackson auction and auction proceedings in general.

Action- ALL- shoot Dan a note with ideas and potential speakers for this Spring season.

Treasurer Report- We continue to be in good fiscal condition. A breakdown of monthly income and expenses is attached. I failed to mention that the nominal account balance at the end of the year is generally around \$REDACTED and 2022 was an anomaly at \$REDACTED – this was largely due to the delay in having sent more than \$2000 in dues checks from the chapter to National and Regional dues into January 2023. This looks like severe deficit spending but just reflects the distortions of pass through dues income and expense.

Secretary Report- none. Given changes in other roles, such as communications it makes sense to identify a Secretary to take over communications with the club.

Action- Jim- talk with Dean in particular about what he does and identify secretary candidate(s).

BoD-

Jim Gill recognized the new and existing board members. Welcome, all. All were in attendance.

Committee Reports

Membership- We had 17 new members join over the course of last year. Based on dues payments, five are not renewing. Note that they never came to a meeting or event. Ray added that when he joined it was very difficult “breaking in” and we need to address this. This is a large problem that we have tried to address unsuccessfully.

Action- Ken to seek “buddies” to contact new members and make an effort to include them in meetings

Jim Gill volunteered to cover for Kazazian's. We need more.

In addition, 12 more have not renewed. Two contacted me as no longer interested and four are in poor health.





“My First Car”

Wilson Fausel’s 1951 Chieftain

Calling all members!. Send me information on your first car!

Wilson Fausel answered the call with a excellent write up about his 1951 2-door Chieftain—Who's next?

In 1968 I graduated high school. My father gave me \$50 and I put that with the \$50 I had and bought a 1951 Buick, 2 door, Chieftain. Straight flat head 8 and a 4 speed automatic.

The car was stored in a shed on a farm not too far from where I lived and had been parked for 8 years, no rust, just farm dust all over. When it was parked, they drained the water and the gas and there is sat.

Eight years later I show up to buy the car for \$100. We put gas in the tank, water in the radiator, added some oil and installed a new battery. It would turn over but would not start. So, the farmer used his truck and pushed me down the road (you could still push start cars with automatics back then. As best as I can remember, we had to hit about 30 MPH for it to start - scary). The car spit and sputtered a few times but fired up and we drove it home.

One at home, my first order of business was to change the oil. So, I purchased some reprocessed motor oil from a local gas station (you know, the oil that came in glass bottles with a metal spout screwed on top of each bottle. I think I paid 25 cents per quart for a 6 pack and 5 cent deposit for each bottle). At home, I pulled the drain plug on the oil pan and, nothing happened. Thinking there was a clog, I stuck a screwdriver in the hole. The only thing that came out was a black, tar like sludge on the end of screwdriver and nothing else.

Not having a lift or tools to pull the oil pan and having blown the total of my estate buying the car, I had to fix it myself. The farmer suggested that I mix half reprocessed oil with half kerosene and add this mixture to the dipstick full mark. Then, I started the car, let it idle until warm, turned it off and let it cool. When I removed the drain plug, this time, the sludge that dripped out was as thick a Kero syrup, but it did drip. I repeated the process 3 more times with more reprocessed oil and kerosene. The draining oil progressively got thinner and less black. Once satisfied with the oil system cleansing, I filled it with more reprocessed oil and a pint of Marvel Mystery oil. I then drove to the local filling station where I filled it with gas and added another can of Marvel Mystery oil to the gas tank.

Driving the car on this mixture made me wonder if I had done the right thing. It smoked like crazy and ran pretty rough. But the more I drove it, the smoother it ran. When I used that tank of gas and filled it again with plain gas, it ran as smooth as a sewing machine and no smoking.

This month is Tried and True Methods- Experience Counts!

We can all use a little help around the garage or shop!

There are times when we need to take a wheel off of a car.

My father (Mikes) taught me that even with jack stands one should, if possible, put a wheel under the brake drum or disc for safety.

This will limit the amount of drop if the vehicle should fall and likely limit any damage. This is especially important when changing a flat tire on the road. Put the flat tire/wheel assembly under the drum or disc while you get the spare tire ready to install.


This will minimize the amount of time the car is jacked up without additional support or a safety item like the flat tire/wheel assembly.

Always use a prop to keep a hood open when working with the hood open. I did not always follow this advice and it cost me a painful lesson.

My 1955 Dodge hood is held up by the hood springs – no prop rod. I had the hood up and was installing a piece of trim on the hood when, due to my fiddling and rather weak hood springs, the hood came crashing down. There was no damage to the car.

However, the pinky finger of my right hand was over the fender lip and the hood trapped my pinky between the hood and the fender. We all know Chrysler products have excellent "fit and finish" yet there was still enough room to trap my finger. I was in my detached garage at 11 PM so I could not call anyone for help. I could not get to the front of the car to open the hood (it latched). I grabbed my right hand with my left and was able to pull my finger free. At first everything looked fine but 5 seconds later the finger began to swell. No damage but a few days later the finger nail died and fell out. Fortunately it grew back.

Some time later I noticed that the technician who works on my cars uses a prop for hoods that do not have a prop rod.
