THROWBACK TIME

SPOTLIGHT ON JIM ALDRICH, and BECKY TOO

JIM'S STORY -

Jim's interest in automobiles dates back practically to day 1 of his life: his father worked for Buick in Flint, Michigan. The family — Jim and his parents — lived in the outskirts of Flint in the town of Corunna. There they had a small farm on which they raised chickens. Jim's dad would often sell fresh eggs and chickens to the men at the Buick plant. While no longer a chicken farm, it's still in the family. Jim owns the farm and rents the land to a local farmer for raising crops.

Jim grew up in Corunna, and completed his schooling there. It was such a small town that there were just 35 seniors in his graduating class. Shop classes were among his favorite subjects in high school — wood shop, metal shop: Jim professes that he was the teacher's pet. He also did well in math, having been encouraged by his father to study hard so that he could go to GMI (the General Motors Institute, now called Kettering University). There was not much free time for Jim. He worked at a gas station during high school, from 4 p.m. until 9 p.m. on school nights, and on Saturdays he washed cars at the station. It was a great education in automobiles.

Although Jim's father worked for Buick, he was partial to Fords. Consequently, the very first car that Jim bought was a 1937 Ford, which he purchased from a local farmer in 1950 for \$25. Jim's next car was a 1940 Ford, followed by a '47 Ford. He then began building hot rods — first from a 1932 Ford pick-up and then a 1951 Ford. Jim worked on the restoration all of his cars, rebuilding transmissions, clutches, etc. Engineering was a perfect fit for his interests and skills.

Jim indeed went to GMI in 1955, on an apprentice program with Chevrolet. He admits that he did not know either Dean Tryon or Les during his GMI years, but he dated some of the Hurley Hospital nurses and maintains that they were a wild bunch. Les was surely the exception. Jim further claims that he did not see his first television program until he was 13 or 14, and that his family had an outhouse until he was in high school. (Polygraph test results are not back yet.)

After receiving his degree from GMI, Jim worked for Chevrolet for about 11 years as a toolmaker, design engineer and processing engineer (engine design), and later in manufacturing applications. During this time, Jim was married briefly. He has 3 children – 2 sons and a daughter – all living in Michigan and all working for the automotive industry.

He left Chevrolet in 1967 and was hired by Kenna Metal, for which he worked the remainder of his career. Jim's expertise was marketing, field applications and trouble-shooting, which took him all over Michigan. From Michigan he was sent to Seattle, Washington, and then on to Denver, where he met Becky.

Jim and Becky were married in 1972, and according to Jim, "from then on it got exciting." The two of them moved to Birmingham, Alabama for a brief stint, and then on to Indianapolis, Indiana. Although they were not there long, Jim found Indianapolis to be an interesting and exciting place with its car, tractor and aircraft businesses as well as car racing.

In 1974 Jim and Becky were transferred to Japan, where they lived in Tokyo for 5 years. Jim sold Kenna Metal products to Japanese automakers, and both he and Becky enjoyed their time there. Then it was off to Singapore for 6 % years. This was Jim's favorite place as far as creature comforts go: understanding the language (English) was particularly helpful. From Singapore they returned to Japan for an additional 4 years, before being sent to South Korea, where they were for the 1988 Summer Olympics. Jim was the Managing Director of the Southeast Asia Region at this time and did a great deal of traveling. Becky often went along.

It was not until 1995 that Jim and Becky returned to live in the States. Jim was assigned to the North American Marketing Office in Raleigh. However, when Kenna Metal decided to move that office to Pennsylvania, Jim took a buy-out. He and Becky liked Raleigh and didn't want to leave, perhaps because their house has a 5-car garage. And yes, all the spaces are filled.

THROWBACK TIME

During the 23 years that Jim and Becky had lived overseas, they hadn't owned a car. Meanwhile, Jim's taste in antique automobiles had changed from hotrods to vintage cars, and in 1997 he "went berserk," joining 5 car clubs. The first car that he showed at a Triangle Chapter event was a 1936 Cadillac. Although the car didn't take any prizes, Jim still has it, along with a 1920s Dodge (it's in pieces). His next purchase was a 1938 Cadillac, which he showed for a while before selling it at the Hilton Head Island Concours automobile auction. Jim then immediately purchased the 1931 Chrysler Imperial with body by LeBaron, which has won many awards.

Last April, the Chrysler received its AACA Senior award at the Charlotte meet. The following day it was part of the Chrysler display on the motor speedway track, where it received an award for Best Chrysler, the People's Choice award, and the Golden Steering Wheel award for Best in Show. Two months later the Chrysler was shown at the Classic Car Club Gilmore Gathering, outside of Kalamazoo. There it took Best of Class, People's Choice, and the People's Choice award of Haggerty Insurance Company's kids' judging competition. There is yet another award that Jim hopes to acquire, and the car is currently being re-painted in preparation for the Grand National show in New Bern this May.

Asked if he has a favorite car manufacturer, Jim responded that he does not - he just likes the old cars. His next purchase? His dream is to own either a 1934 Packard or a 1932 Duesenberg. He'll decide which one to buy when he wins the lottery.

Although Jim is retired, he is not idle. He works part-time at a collision repair and car restoration shop in Benson, which is where the '31 Chrysler is being painted. Jim and his two sons have a joint venture in Michigan restoring muscle cars. The barn on the old family farm is their workshop. Jim tries to get back to Michigan every other month to see his family, which now includes 5 grandchildren and 3 great-grandchildren, and to take care of business. As a sidelight, Jim does special design work for an Indiana company that makes trailers. Riley Reiner and Rob VanDewoestine are two of his satisfied customers.

Jim enjoys being an active member of the Triangle chapter. He loves working on cars, displaying them and touring in them. The chapter's Thursday dinners and excellent programs are greatly appreciated by both Jim and Becky.

BECKY'S VERSION

Becky Baker was a single girl, working in Denver and living in an apartment complex. One day, in the laundry room of the complex, a young man came in with his laundry and introduced himself as Jim Aldrich. He announced that today was his birthday and he was having a party: the young lady was invited. Intrigued by such an unusual pick-up line, Becky went to Jim's apartment that evening and it indeed was filled with people celebrating his birthday.

They began dating, but Jim got transferred to Alabama — a good distance from Denver. In fact, it was so costly to fly back to Denver on weekends that Jim decided it would be cheaper to get married. He proposed. Becky accepted. They were married on a Saturday and moved to Birmingham, Alabama on Sunday. Like Jim, Becky was an only child, and her parents, Dee and Bob, were not very happy that she would be so far away. (Most of us know Becky's delightful mother, Dee, who has attended many of our AACA functions.)

Becky had grown up in Denver and had never been away from home. Moving to Alabama was like moving to a foreign country, as far as she was concerned. But she and Jim weren't there very long before they were sent to Indianapolis. There Becky worked for L'Eggs, driving a truck and delivering shipments of pantyhose, attired in the company uniform -- hot-pants and boots. Becky loved her job: her schedule was her own and she was doing well. She was in line to become a district manager, until Jim phoned one day and said, "Quit your job, we're moving to Japan."

The move to Japan was a major adjustment for Becky. They had been told that they only needed to take their clothes because the Japanese apartments were "furnished." They arrived to discover that, among other things, there were no beds and no sheets in the apartment. Furthermore, Jim left on business the day after their arrival. Becky bravely faced the language barrier and went shopping for furnishings. Not realizing that stores would deliver items, she would take the train into town, make a purchase, take the item back to the apartment, and then go back into town on the train for the next purchase. She and Jim were the only Americans with Kenna Met al in Asia at the time, which made for an even greater challenge.

So many members make mistakes and either forget that they only paid National or double pay National. This creates delays and a lot of extra work. Unfortunately, I have no way of knowing whether you have already paid National if you don't pay through me until after the deadline. It is a lot easier for me if you send me your dues for \$70 and I distribute them to the other parts of the organization.

Dues are due by December 31st. Please help by paying on time. In late January, National locks down the new Roster for the chapter and late dues sometimes cause members to not be put back on the Chapter Roster for the year. (Although they will be recognized as having paid National).

Attached is a dues renewal form. Please look at your personal entry in this year's directory and confirm that it is correct. Denny uses these records to update the Directory. If correct, no need to repeat the information on the renewal form. I continue to try and streamline the process.


