

15. Accelerator Pump Tech Lesson

Does anyone know what this part is? You

One of the most replaced and least understood carburetor is the accelerator pump. When it works, you do not know it When it fails, the driver knows it quickly due to hard cold starting, poor accelerations, engine stumbling when the throttle is opened and possible on accelerations.

These pumps were used first in the 1930's and have been a critical in carburetors ever since. The assembly on the right consists of (top to stem, a retainer, the duration spring and the pump cup. What does it do? When the throttle is opened, the plunger is depressed small, brief stream of gasoline into the venturi area of a carburetor.

The problem is basic physics. When the driver opens the throttle quickly, the air responds instantly but the fuel, with greater mass than air, takes a short time to catch up. In this short time (0.5 sec typically), the ratio of air to fuel goes lean (too little fuel) and the engine will run poorly momentarily.

A good analogy would be this syringe. When you fill it with air and press the end, the plunger will push the air out immediately. If you fill it with a liquid, a small stream comes out the small orifice on the bottom as you depress the plunger. BUT, remember that a liquid is not compressible. What happens if you depress the plunger with much greater your thumb (i.e., your foot)? The liquid fuel cannot compress so the syringe would break (i.e., the throttle linkage in the carb).

The throttle can be opened in as little as 0.1 sec. The accelerator pump shot is longer (0.5 sec typical) to match the time it takes for the fuel to catch up with the extra air during an acceleration.

This is the "why" we need it, now for the "how" it works.

The pump assembly is mounted in the float bowl and the stem is downward as the throttle is opened by the lever shown on the duration spring keeps the pump cup firmly at the bottom of its the throttle is opened slowly, fuel is pushed down, opens the check ball and injects a brief stream of fuel into the air stream as If the throttle is opened faster than fuel can be discharged, the spring collapses allowing the throttle linkage to be fully open.

The lower return spring simply assures that the stem stays in the throttle linkage. Some carburetors use a bend at the top to eliminate this spring.

Fuel moves into and out of the pump cavity thru 1 or 2 as shown in illustration. When the throttle closes, the moves up and fuel fills the area below the pump cup with the inlet valve. When the throttle is opened, the inlet ball the outlet or discharge ball opens to allow fuel to be into the air stream near the venturi.



Restoration Tips:

- 1. The common failure mode of older carburetors with cups is shown in this photo. The pump on the left is old. no longer pliable, and you can see the internal spring keep the leather in contact with the bore. The pump cup is a new leather cup. Leather has been replaced with a viton material that has much better durability in is shown on the right with the black cup.
- 2. Before taking the carburetor off the car, remove the air with the engine off, open the throttle several times and are brief fuel sprays from the pump into the venturi area. sign of fuel, and if the carburetor bowl is full, most likely failed.
- 3. Remove the top of the carburetor (air horn) and carefully note where the check balls are located and if they are secured. Some are at the bottom of the pump cavity and retained by the return spring. Do not turn the carburetor upside down to drain the fuel until you have them in-hand. Once they fall onto your garage floor, they are gone forever (been there - done that).
- 4. Measure the diameter of each check ball; they are not all the same and are not interchangeable.
- 5. Before reassembling the carburetor, gently, manually press the pump cup into the bowl cavity (can be dry or wet). It should have a smooth light pressure indicating it is sealing.

16. Stress Free Speedometer Oiler Instructions

As reported by Mike Petersen

Some speedometer heads, like the ones used for the 1955 Dodge, have a wick oiler contained in a cylindrical holder that threads into the back of the speedometer head. Service is rather simple:

- 1. Unscrew the oiler (the holder has a knurled as well as a slotted end and is easily removed with nimble fingers)
- 2. Remove the wick (it pulls right out of the holder)
- 3. Oil the wick (light oil is probably best)
- 4. Insert the wick back into the holder
- 5. Screw the oiler holder back into the speedometer head finger tight

The biggest challenge is in putting the oiler holder back in place. It is difficult to lie on your back and get your hand up through the maze of wires and cables to access the oiler holder. If it does not thread in and you drop it then the oiler holder will likely find its way into the "black hole" of the dash board.

This happened to me twice. The first time I dropped the holder I heard a metallic "ping" as it went into the "black hole". After a futile search I got a spare from another speedometer. I then put a cloth among the wires under the speedometer to catch the holder if I dropped it again.

On my second attempt with my spare, I dropped it again. I did not hear the "ping" but my cloth did not have the holder when I pulled the cloth out. I figured the holder had joined its buddy in the "black hole".

I got a second (and last) spare from another speedometer. This time I tied a long length of dental floss on the holder so that if I dropped it again, I could just pull it out of the "black hole" with the dental floss. This time it threaded in perfectly. I left the floss tied to the holder and tucked the rest along the edge of the dash board for the next time I needed to remove the oiler.

These oilers are "out of sight, out of mind". I have found that with the 1955 Dodge the speedometer needle will start swinging back and forth when the head needs oil. The first time this happened to me the speedometer cable broke after a few swings of the needle. Thinking the problem was the cable, I replaced the speedometer cable and was able to drive about 60 feet before the needle swung again and the new speedometer cable broke.

I removed the speedometer and found that the head was frozen. Examination of the oiler revealed the wick was dry. I was able to loosen the mechanism by applying WD40 and working the mechanism back and forth with the end of the broken speedometer cable. I oiled the wick, reinstalled it, and life was good.

The second time the needle started to swing (on a different speedometer) I was able to fix it before the speedometer cable broke and without removing the speedometer. I sprayed some WD40 into the speedometer oiler hole, oiled the wick (it was dry as were my two spare wicks), and life again was good.


Epilogue:

I renewed my search for the missing oiler holders and found one in the shroud covering the steering column and the other behind the accelerator pedal. I was lucky – the dash board "black hole" had not claimed them.

Tying dental floss or a piece of string onto a part or tool is an inexpensive way to save time in retrieval operations.
