2016 AACA Awards – Philiadelphia, PA Denny Oestreich

In December of 2015 I was notified that I had been awarded a Webmaster Award for the NC Region Website. I was invited to AACA 80th Annual Meeting and Awards ceremony On Feb 12-13 at the Sheraton Hotel in Downtown Philadelphia. After reviewing the registration form Merry and I decided to participate in as many of the activities and events as possible. So we sent in our application and planned the trip. We decided to fly to Philadelphia instead of driving. The event was very enjoyable. I will list the highlights of what we did and what we saw.



- 1. Travel by Plane direct flight. 2 hours. Better for me than driving up 195.
- 2. Taxi from airport to Sheraton hotel. Still up 195, 30 minutes. Fastest way to get there.
- 3. Philadelphia was COLD in Feb. Arrived at 5:30 PM too late for early registration.
- 4. Checked into Sheraton Downtown. Room on the 14th floor. Nice room and great view.
- 5. Dinner at Hotel. Too cold to go out to local restaurants.
- 6. Registration on Friday morning. Badges tickets for events etc. Lots of people.
- 7. Eight Seminars attended: Titles/Topic and one thing I learned. **Friday**

a. Electroplating – Rick Smith of R&D Finishing (Used to be part of Tri-City Plating) in Tennessee gave a great talk about re-plating/refinishing pot metal and stainless. Multiple layers of Copper plating, silver solder, hand sanding, dremmel, chrome plating, and lots of buffing are the keys to pot metal restoration. Mr. Smith prefers you "work a couple extra hours at what you do to earn money and send him the money rather than trying to prepare the item yourself".



- b. Collector Car Auctions Megan Boyd of Mecum Auctions discussed registering your car for an auction, negotiating auction costs, registering to bid and methods of bidding. Mecum matches sellers with the best auction and advertises your vehicle. There are costs to register, sell (8%) and to buy (8%). Be sure your title is correct.
- c. The Appraisers TV Show Panel discussion with the producer and stars of the show. They have fun testing cars. One of the stars works at the AACA Museum.
- d. AACA Library. Major collections of donated automotive literature. Every AACA member can get 90 minutes of research from the library staff for **free**.
- e. Webmasters Forum AACA is recommending all Regions and Chapters move to new Word Press Web Formats. This will be a challenge.
- f. Restoration Expert Tom Zitkus discussed a high quality restoration of a 1956 Chrysler Convertible. He stressed being very protective of restored parts. He uses lots of tape and cover finished parts.

Saturday

- National Judging School. Similar to NC Region Judging Schools. I received another judging chit. AACA has no point deductions for over restoration.
- Restoration Experiences G. Wayne Miller lead an open forum on various topics on restorations.



- 8. General Membership Meeting. The AACA Board of Directors and Officers as well as the AACA staff were introduced and general business reports were reviewed. Upcoming events and the hosting Regions were introduced. The nearby National Show in New Bern, NC on August 11-13, 2016 was promoted.
- 9. Presidents Dinner. Merry and I attended the President's dinner in place of Riley Reiner. It was an interesting event. Many regions made donations of \$50 to \$5000 dollars to the various arms of the AACA including the scholarship program, the Library, the Museum and the AACA general fund.

- 10. Trade Show. A large area in the Hotel meeting area was devoted to the AACA Trade Show. Many vendors had booths to advertise their products including collector car insurance companies, restoration shops, parts suppliers, and the AACA merchandize store. Also on display were six extremely well restored vehicles including 3 1935 vehicles that were 80 years old. Also on display was the 2016 Raffle Corvette, which I am hoping to win.
- 11. The Awards Banquet On Saturday evening awards were presented in three different categories: AACA Judged vehicles, Scholarships; and Publications.
 - 87 of the Top 245 AACA Judged vehicles nominated were given awards.
 - There are six national college scholarships that were given out.
 - Multiple Master Editor Awards Newsletter and Webmaster Awards presented.

When I picked my Master Editor Award I opened it immediately and put it on the table. Then I noticed that the other award winners were not opening their awards. Later I learned that most of the winners have won awards previously and "being delighted was evidence you were a rookie and not cool".

12. Merry attended two seminars specifically for the ladies. She enjoyed meeting many new people at the event. She also took the bus tour of Philadelphia stopping at interesting places in the city. The weather was cold and her decision to walk a mile back to the hotel from the Market was a long windy teeth chattering walk at 10 degrees F.

We met many interesting people and got reacquainted with car people from all over we had known from other car club events. There were four members from the Triangle Region at the event: Riley Reiner, Mike Peterson, Merry and me. We also met Dan and Ann Russel who were there with friends from their new Region. In the evening we had opportunity to meet a lot of AACA members at the AACA and Haggerty Hospitality rooms. Our plane trip back from Philadelphia was uneventful, no bumps. Attending was fun, but expensive. We enjoyed the weekend.
